*Prof. Jennie Popay* is Professor of Sociology and Public Health in the School of Health and Medicine at Lancaster University, UK and regional director of the NIHR Research Design Service for the North West of England. She worked as a volunteer in schools and adult literacy in East Africa and attended university in New Zealand before returning to the UK in the 1970's. Since then she has worked in social policy and public health in academia, the voluntary sector and the NHS. Her research interests include the social determinants of health and health equity, social exclusion; the sociology of knowledge with a particular focus on lay knowledge; the evaluation of complex area based interventions; the impact of community engagement/empowerment; and methods for the synthesis of diverse evidence. Her current research includes a study of ways of assessing the impact of patient and public involvement in research and an NIHR funded evaluation of the impact of the English regeneration programme New Deal for Communities on health inequalities. She was founding convenor of the Cochrane Qualitative Research Methods Group and has completed several evidence reviews including a review of the impact of community engagement in health development and on help seeking behaviour in relation to DOTS TB programmes. She co-ordinated a global knowledge network on social exclusion for the WHO Commission on the Social Determinants of Health, worked with the Marmot review of health inequalities policy in England and is currently the chair of the Task Group on Disadvantage, Social Exclusion and Vulnerability working with the Marmot review of Social Determinants of Health in the WHO EURO region.
